RESPONSE

CARE Team Responds to Community Tragedy

On the morning of Nov. 14, 2019, the landscape of the Santa Clarita community was "forever changed" when a student opened fire on fellow students at Saugus High School. Two students were killed as a result of the shooting, and three others injured before the gunman turned the gun on himself.

In the wake of the sudden tragedy, the Santa Clarita community came together in a way that many say they had "never seen before." Child & Family Center's CARE Team (Crisis Aftercare Response & Education) responded immediately by providing crisis counseling to students and teachers on campus. Support Groups were quickly organized for that night at the Center, and ongoing grief and support groups for both students, parents and teachers continued for several months following.







CHALLENGES

Providing Services During the Pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic in the last quarter had a significant impact on our clients. There was a noticeable increase in the demand for mental



health services. Bereavement, isolation, loss of income and fear triggered mental health conditions or exacerbated existing ones. Many reported increased levels of insomnia, and anxiety.

The agency immediately responded to stay-at-home orders in March by implementing a telehealth model for providing services.

Our clinical staff worked safely from home so the low-income children, families and adults we serve could continue to receive care.

877 clients accessed services via telehealth, resulting in 6,369 therapy sessions.

Many clinicians and staff members worked on site to provide services for those clients who preferred in-person therapy sessions. Safety protocols were developed and implemented.

Our field-based services team continued to provide in-home care while adhering to strict safety guidelines.

Our Alcohol & Drug Program continued individual and group sessions via zoom.

The Domestic Violence Program reported a 50% decline in crisis calls, even though statistics showed a dramatic increase in law enforcement response to domestic violence situations. The team provided support for survivors through telehealth and phone visits.

Case Managers worked diligently to seek resources for those facing food insecurity, housing and job loss.

Despite personal stress, illness and lifestyle disruptions, our staff have continued to serve clients with empathy and care. Their commitment and dedication have allowed us to continue to respond to needs as they arise.

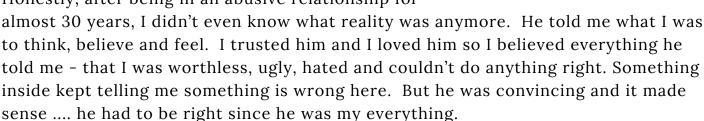


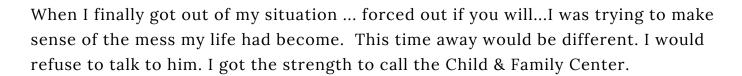

Honestly, after being in an abusive relationship for





I was shaking during my first appointment. I was in tears by the end. The entire time my counselor kept telling me she understood and was so proud of me for just getting there. I recounted past events of hitting, choking and screaming. It was so hard to admit & hear the words come out of my mouth because I had covered it up for so many years. As I answered her questions, I realized she understood what had happened to me and the shame I felt. I have never cried so much in my life, as she comforted me and encouraged me to take the next step.

I took classes. That first day I remember my head hung so low in shame. I had a hard time believing this wasn't my fault. But week after week they educated me on what had happened and I could see it plain as day. I got stronger every week. I learned about gaslighting and the use of emotional control.

Week after week new victims joined the class, starting out the same way I did. We found ourselves closely bound by our experiences. We knew that no one could possibly understand except our counselor and us.

The amount of understanding, caring and dedication the staff has is unbelievable. They never gave up on us. They encouraged, cried and gave us tools. The programs they offer are incredible and life changing, so we don't end up in the same relationship again.

Without them I don't know where I would be...back in that same house, I suppose. I thank God for them and pray that they are able to continue the work that they do. I look forward to visiting them with a Ten Year Praise Report on my life. It's all because of them! With great gratitude and love.

Child & Family Center was awarded membership in APPIC (Association of Psychology Postdoctoral and Internship Centers) in June, 2020. As a member, the Agency is included in the centralized location for graduate students to apply for postdoctoral positions, fellowships, and internships.

Student Training

Nine students were enrolled in our student training program in 2019/20. The program offers practicums for Marriage & Family Therapy and Psychology; and intern opportunities for Doctoral Psychology, and Master in Social Work. Students work in various departments and programs within the Agency such as Outpatient Mental Health, Early Childhood Mental Health, Domestic Violence, and Substance Use Disorders. The students gain exposure to the varied roles that clinicians play in community mental health agencies, in a supportive learning environment.

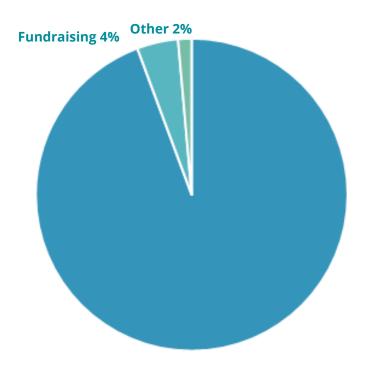

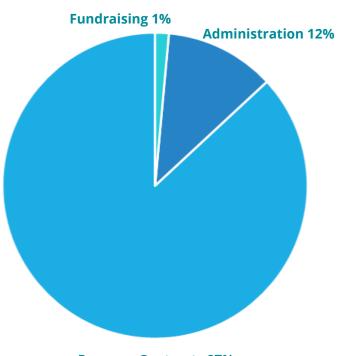
FINANCIAL OVERVIEW
